Alcoholic recovery (Jay Patterson), a tyrant turned teddy bear, is struggling to care for his cancer-scoured wife, Masako (the adorable Ako), with the help of his two adult daughters: Sophie (Emma Kikue), a born-again Christian, and Hiro (Satomi Blair), a self-absorbed cynic. Long away from her abusive father, Hiro fled to New York City years ago, but she agrees to fly back to her lower-class home in Lexington, Kentucky, to lend a hand (and occasionally to shake). Trying to coexist at this complex intersection of race, class, and faith during a crisis is a recipe for drama, such as the playwright, a Japanese-American woman raised primarily in the state of Bluegrass, presumably knows it. Winkler's characters overflow with unexpected contradictions and hand out charges that make them look like they exist beyond the confines of this story. In fact, they do. God Said This is an unofficial sequel to Kentucky, which focused on the same family seven years earlier (and whose off-Broadway production of 2016 featured many of the same actors and the same director, Morgan Gould). This plausibility, reinforced by solid interpretations of the entire cast, is the finest attribute of this vivid character study. But while God said this he faces compelling themes of forgiveness, redemption, loneliness, and legacy, the narrative is not particularly cohesive or compelling. While parts of the work are insightful and entertaining, such as James's hilarious AA speeches and blasphemy reunion sessions between Hiro and John (a very silly Tom Coiner), a businessman and a father who breaks red-necked stereotypes, other scenes are stained with bathos, as the story winds its obvious, if poignant conclusion.
